weekend, folks have been gathering at Weathers Park in downtown Loretto for the Loretto Farmers Market.

This event, which seems more like a festival, is the brainchild of several local growers from around the county and other interested parties who put their heads together to create something that is part entertainment—with various

activities each week—part uniquely prepared wholesome

products, and part food!

After creating a website and Facebook account (the latter being my part in this whole shebang), we have been hearing from folks from around the country, particularly from a wide swath of Tennessee and into Alabama. It seems that people just LOVE a good old farmers market, and Loretto is bringing one into fruition, one week and multiple ripening fruits and vegetables at a time!

There's something else we are hearing. People who grew up here are participating in the online forums, cheering us on, and remarking about how they wish they could join us. It seems that nostalgia for living in Lawrence County abounds, and those who do live here have much to be thankful for. Vendors bring fresh vegetables, fruit, fresh cut flowers, bedding plants, soaps, honey, herbs, baked goods, eggs, jams, jellies, grass-fed beef & lamb, poultry, pastured pork, homemade candies, and more from Middle Tennessee producers, while local musicians gather in the gazebo to create an ambience of a music festival. Every week has been different, with new produce coming in, new vendors joining in, and activities alternating (including story time and a book walk for children). 
