Dear Carole: I work with a sweet lady who has body odor so bad that I do not want to be close to her and neither do my coworkers. Is there a subtle way to let her know she smells bad? Grateful for ideas.

Dear Grateful: Is there a subtle way? No. No one wants to hear those words, no matter how kindly they are said. Almost everyone has some body odor at times due to perspiration and oils that the body naturally emits.

However, this has to be extremely unpleasant for all you. Since your coworkers know about the problem, one of the ways I like to address an awkward issue is to not single out a person right away. Instead, have a few employees meet, say... in the break room, making sure she is invited. Then bring up the situation in clear terms. "It has come to the attention of everyone here that someone has unpleasant body odor. If this is a medical problem, please speak with your doctor about it. But if it's a simple matter of not bathing or not wearing clean under garments, not maintaining good hygiene, you need to take the initiative yourself to correct the problem. Folks, soap is not expensive, and neither is water."

If she she's smart, she'll realize she's the one. Give it a week or two and if she still has odor, purchase (or put together) a pretty gift basket of soap, deodorant, fancy washcloth, mints, other toiletries, small containers of dental care items. Call her aside privately so as not to embarrass her. Of course this is the time to be direct yet kind.

Come on. Brave up now and say to her, "The previous meeting involved discussion about one person on this team having bad odor. Would you have any idea who that person is?" Her response probably will be one of two: she'll realize she's the one, or she'll ask, "who?"

Either way, the opportunity now is before you to help her understand. The dialog has been opened. Be complimentary. Praise her work and kindness, or something else she does well. Be sure to say you care about her and you want others to also. Then present the basket of gifts, and ask her to try them (and hope to goodness she isn't allergic to any of them)

Once she has had a few days to use them to see if she likes the results herself, when she's again in your presence at work, do two or three "pretend sniffs" in the air and say, "Mmm, someone here smells so nice!" She should know who you mean. Let's hope that she has chosen to make a permanent change, and that she'll be grateful you had the courage to tell her. **Replies in "Dear Carole" are not meant to be considered professional advice or formal
